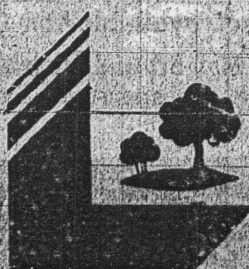

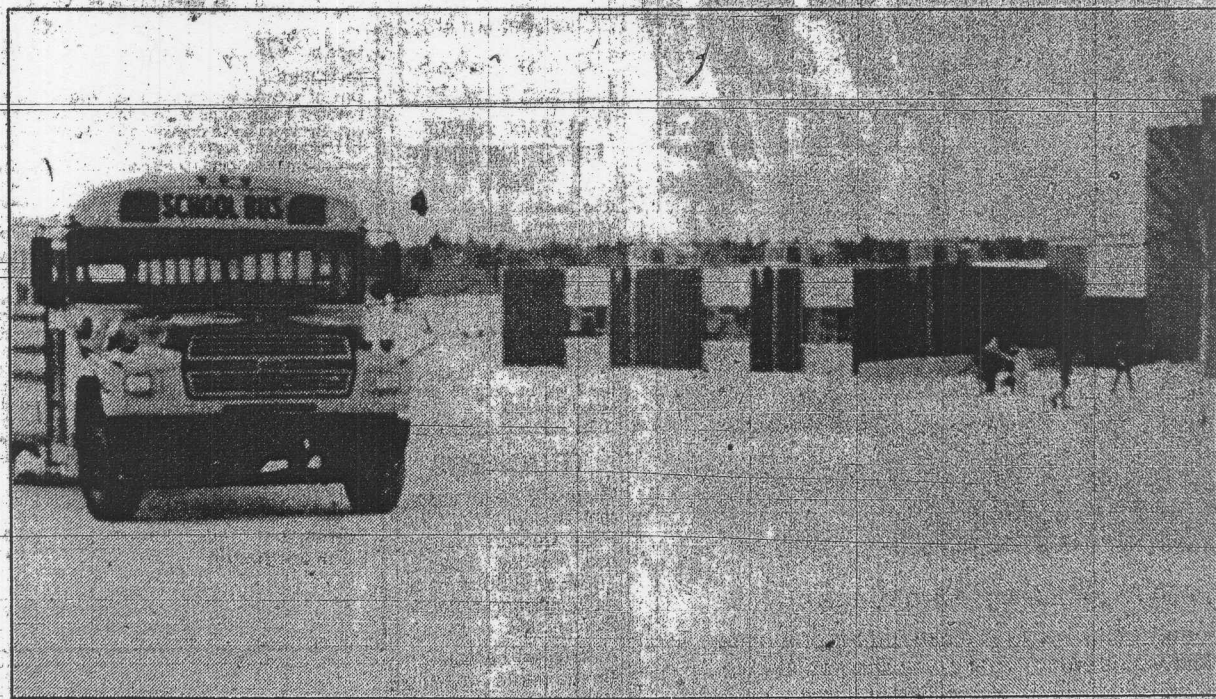

Federation supporting dairy fight

The P.E.I. Federation of Agriculture has supported the dairy industry's present battle to get the federal government to clarify its position on supply management, and its long-term plans.

Federation president Gary Heaney said his organization is concerned about the federal government's recent decision to freeze industrial milk prices for 20 months, at the same time asking producers to absorb additional costs through the loss of subsidy on export quota and operating-marketing costs of the Canadian Dairy Commission.

"When all of these factors are combined, the federation of Agriculture believes the net result will be undue hardship for milk producers across the country," Mr. Heaney said. "We are concerned that a five-year commitment was made to the industry by the government in early 1986, and it now seems as if some elements of this long term dairy policy are being abandoned."

He said there's little doubt farmers are willing to shoulder their share of debt-reduction burden but the measures announced in the budget will cost producers \$14 million a year in addition to the freeze on industrial prices.

"Our share of that \$14 million on P.E.I. will be \$260,000 per year," Mr. Heaney said. "In addition, the freeze on industrial milk affects 86 per cent of all milk produced on P.E.I. That's higher than any other province and means we will be hit the hardest."

"It's crucial that the federal government reverse these actions immediately."

Mr. Heaney said the Federation of Agriculture will be contacting both provincial and federal government officials to express these concerns.

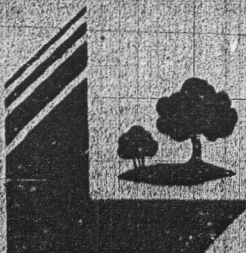

pan after bombing missions off the coast of Vietnam. In its statement then, the navy said the incident took place "more than 500 miles (800 kilometres) from land at sea in the Pacific."

However, Handler and William Arkin, defence analyst for the Institute for Policy Studies, a liberal Washington-based research centre, discovered from Ticonderoga log books that the accident occurred in international waters about 130 kilometres from the closest point of the Okinawa island chain and only about 300 kilometres east of the heavily populated island of Okinawa.

Handler, interviewed by telephone, declined to provide a complete list of the 43 nuclear weapons and 11 reactors he believes are on the ocean floor. But the known incidents include:

- A Soviet Mike submarine, April 7, 1989, with two reactors.
- A Soviet Yankee submarine in 1986, with 32 warheads and two reactors.
- A Soviet November submarine in 1970, with two reactors.
- The U.S. submarine Scorpion, in 1968, with one reactor.
- The U.S. B-43 bomb from the Ticonderoga in 1965.
- The U.S. submarine Thresher, in 1963, with one reactor.

A complete list of the nuclear devices that Greenpeace believes are on the ocean floor will be released in June, Handler said.

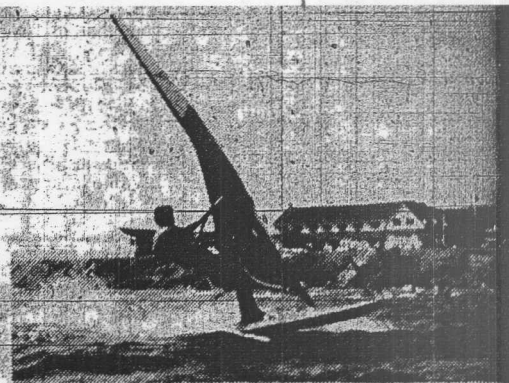
rolled in the national tripartite price stabilization program will receive payments of \$38.24 per hog for the first quarter of 1989.

Cheques will be sent to those producers in the nine-member provinces who have chosen to enroll voluntarily in the plan.

The announcement was made by the National Stabilization Committee of representatives from producer groups and federal and provincial governments.

Hog producers are now feeling the full effects of the 1988 drought. The highest ever production costs, along with the lowest average hog prices since the second quarter of 1980, resulted in the biggest ever shortfall between production costs and returns.

Hog producers enrolled in the program are eligible for the \$38.24 per hog payment based on the difference between the support price of \$169.81 per 100 kilograms and the average national market price of \$121.84 per 100 kilograms multiplied by an average hog weight of 79.7 kilograms.
