Bend Spells Out Liberal Policies

RIVERS, Man. (Special) — Former Liberal cabinet minister Robert Bend, speaking at a nominating convention in Hamilton riding Thursday night, mapped out his party's campaign platforms for education and finance, and highway construction.

The former health minister coupled revelations on Liberal policies with sharp criticism of the Roblin government, particularly in the field of finance.

Dealing with education, Mr. Bend enunciated this program for the further reform of the province's education system:

- Establishment of merit rating.
- Cancellation of the present sliding scale of grants for school construction, and substitution of an across the board 75 per cent capital grant.
- Payment by the provincial government of 75 per cent of the cost of snow-plowing on van routes in the new school divisions.

production of the new school division set up.

The speaker climaxed a scathing attack on Premier Roblin's financial policies with a claim that the government has lost its bargaining position with the federal government on assistance for the Manitoba flood control program.

He said Premier Roblin, by telling the legislature that Manitoba will go it alone on the flood control scheme, effectively reduced the possibility of getting aid from the senior government.

Says Duff Defeated Himself

HOLLAND, Man. (Special) — Liberal leader Douglas Campbell hammered on the theme that Premier Duff Roblin "defeated himself" in the legislature in a 30-minute speech to a nominating convention at Holland on Thursday.

Mr. Campbell appeared on the platform with Gildas Moigat, Liberal member for Ste. Rose in the last legislature, and stressed that "we've got good young folks coming along in our party."

"Things are quite a lot different now than they were last June," said the party leader. He said the 160 people who attended the nominating convention for Cypress constituency provided a good example of the change in thinking.

The former premier said people were beginning to say that:

- "Between Dief and Duff,
- "Things are getting tough."
- "It's true," said Mr. Campbell,
- "that Premier Roblin has expanded some services and policies which we had initiated. But the only thing that is new is a higher level of spending."
- Mr. Moigat said a speech which mines and resources minister Hon. Gurney Evans had made in Portage in Prairie outlining "ways in which the Conservative government was saving \$10 million" was "a fake and a phony."
- The nominating convention chose John Leslie Sundell, a 39-year-old Holland district farmer and garage owner, as his candidate in Cypress. He won over Mel Jeffrey, a district farmer who was nominated by former Liberal MLA Sam Burch.

FINANCIAL POLICY

Discussing the financial policies a re-elected Liberal government would follow, he said the pay-as-you-go system used by the Liberals in the past would be restored where possible.

Increases in various provincial licence fees would be wiped out because the Liberals believe the government should only break even on licensing operations. He said the Conservatives want to make money on licence fees which are essentially a service to the people.

Staff increases would be limited to cases where the dictates of economy and efficiency made them essential. He said many of the 700 new employees to be hired by the Roblin government will be paid to do work that is already being efficiently handled by the present staff.

Children Killed In Bomb Blast

MANILA (AP) — A 500-pound salvaged bomb exploded in a central Luzon fishing village Friday, and the Philippine news service said at least 34 persons were killed and many others injured.

The report said most of the dead were children between three and 12 years old.

The news service said fishermen had taken the bomb from a sunken ship in Lingayen Bay and were taking it apart, to use the explosives in fishing. Many of those killed were standing around watching the operation.

The explosion occurred near Dagupan, in Pangasinan province.

The Meat We Ate

OTTAWA (CP) — Canadians consumed an average 138.1 pounds of red meat last year, down from 142.6 pounds in 1957, the bureau of statistics reported Thursday.

But output of Canadian livestock farms was up with increased export sales.

There were decreases in Canadian consumption of beef, veal and fancy meats and increases in pork and canned meats.

The big drop was in consumption of beef—to 64.8 pounds from 74.6—reflecting a rise in prices after increased cattle sales to the United States.

Pork consumed per capita rose to 51.8 pounds from 49.2 as supplies increased in the second half of 1958. Canadians consumed an average 8.3 pounds of veal, 2.7 pounds of mutton and lamb, 4.9 pounds of offal, or fancy meats, and 5.2 pounds of canned meats.
