Proven Leadership - the Record

Over the past four years, we have built a strong economy with lots of options and growing potential for Nova Scotia. In partnership with Nova Scotians, the John Hamm Government has:

- ✓ Achieved two back-to-back balanced budgets for the first time in 40 years.
- ✓ Lowered personal and small business taxes.
- ✓ Launched Opportunities for Prosperity, Nova Scotia's first economic development strategy in a decade. Created in partnership with business and labour, this strategy identifies new approaches and partnerships to support Nova Scotia's long-term growth.
- Expanded opportunities to invest in Nova Scotia and to enhance business access to capital financing by extending the Equity Tax Credit to 2006.
- ✓ Created Nova Scotia Business Inc., a new arm's-length agency with business expertise to take politics out of economic development decisions and to ensure investment decisions are based on sound business analysis.
- ✓ Used community economic development investment funds to attract \$5 million in venture capital funding for Nova Scotia small businesses.
- ✓ Invested \$15 million in Nova Scotia's first Research and Innovation Trust Fund, supporting our universities and hospitals leverage additional federal and corporate funds to support research and innovation.
- ✓ Doubled the size of InNOVAcorp's Nova Scotia First Fund with an additional \$8 million investment. The Nova Scotia First Fund is used to help innovative ideas into commercial success stories.

- Established a new program to expand commercial lending to Nova Scotia small businesses, through Credit Union Central and the Nova Scotia Cooperative Council.
- ✓ Developed Seizing the Opportunity, a comprehensive energy strategy to ensure Nova Scotia receives maximum benefit from its resources.
- ✓ Put in place a common sense, market-driven natural gas distribution system that will see 20,000 Nova Scotians have access to this new energy source within six years.
- ✓ Convinced Ottawa to review the Canada-Nova Scotia Offshore Accord, which guaranteed that Nova Scotia would be the principal beneficiary of its offshore resources — a key demand of the province's Campaign for Fairness.
- Established the Nova Scotia Skills Agenda and created the Skills Partnership Forum to ensure Nova Scotians have the skills required to meet future job demands.
- ✓ Opened up 1,000 new community college seats, with a commitment to increase the number by another 2,500 seats.
- Created Nova Scotia's hugely successful First School for Adult Learning, providing older Nova Scotians with new opportunities to advance their education.
- Passed a new Apprenticeship Act and adopted a multi-year strategy to expand trades training opportunities throughout the province.
- ✓ Invested an additional \$68 million in capital highway spending over the last three years.
- ✓ Re-established the Department of Tourism and Culture, strengthened the Tourism Partnership Council, and expanded marketing campaigns to encourage tourism year round.
- ✓ Invested \$5 million through our Cultural Industries Program to increase awareness and expand export sales of Nova Scotia's art, theatre, music and literature.

A Plan that's Working the Next Steps

A strong, diverse economy remains a priority for us. Our goals are to:

- Help the private sector create at least 30,000 new jobs in next four years.
- · Post trade surpluses in each year of our mandate.

Key elements of our strategy are support for small business, an efficient transportation network, expanding exports and investments, stronger communities, our culture and hospitality, new energy opportunities and our resource sector. In partnership with Nova Scotians, a Progressive Conservative Government will:

- □ Continue to be a responsible government that lives within its means.
- □ Ensure that Nova Scotia has the most competitive tax environment in Atlantic Canada.
- ☐ Guarantee the 10% payroll tax deduction takes effect January 1, 2004.
- □ Complete the remaining steps in Opportunities for Prosperity, including supporting Nova Scotia's ocean, land and tourism sectors and assisting the continued growth of emerging industries: life sciences, energy, advanced manufacturing and the learning and digital economies.
- □ Extend Nova Scotia's Research and Innovation Trust Fund to continue supporting university and hospital research.
- ☐ Continue to expand e-government services/approvals/payments across government and expand the one-stop shopping services offered through Nova Scotia Business Registry through new negotiated agreements with other levels of government.
- □ Take further action to reduce red tape through a new process to streamline the regulatory environment across government and between governments.
- □ Invest in new entrepreneurship training in co-operation with our school boards, community colleges and universities, so Nova Scotia can nurture more homegrown business leaders.
- □ Use the recently signed Provincial Nominee Program as a catalyst for developing a comprehensive immigration policy for Nova Scotia.
- □ Convene a tri-partite labour relations roundtable with representatives from the private sector, public sector and organized labour — to discuss ways to improve collective bargaining and to ensure Nova Scotia's labour climate supports a growing econom.

Support for small business

Encouraging entrepreneurship

□ Continue to increase the annual business limit under which the small business tax rate applies from \$225,000 (03-04) to \$300,000 (06-07), saving qualifying small business \$11,000 per year.

☐ Establish a Small Business Growth Division within Nova Scotia Business Inc. Work with stakeholders to direct a portion of Nova Scotia Pension Funds to Nova Scotia investments. Increase access to capital by investigating the creation of a capital pool program. Develop an aggressive program to help small business bid on government goods and services, including establishing a new Supplier Development Program and providing new outreach services and community workshops on accessing procurement opportunities. Roads, bridges, rails, airports and ports Supporting an integrated road, sea and rail network for getting our products to market ☐ Increase funding for 4Rs program (resurfacing, restoration, rehabilitation and reconstruction) of provincial highways by 10 per cent over four years. ☐ Implement a multi-year plan to expand Nova Scotia's 100 series highway system to improve safety, expand capacity and stimulate economic growth. □ Double the funding for rural road improvements through the Road Improvement Money (RIM) program, from \$10 million to \$20 million by year four. ☐ Implement a five-year \$50 million Steel Truss Bridge Replacement Program. Legislate and co-operatively fund a new Capital District Transportation Authority in consultation with the Halifax Regional Municipality (HRM) to resolve the growing traffic/transportation-related problems resulting from HRMs' growing population. ☐ Implement a comprehensive Salt Management Strategy to reduce the impact on the environment and achieve cost efficiencies. Continue to press the federal government to establish a longterm national transportation strategy that allocates a greater share of federal gas tax dollars to Nova Scotia highways. Support the growth of the Halifax International Airport, in concert with promoting complementary cargo and passenger opportunities for smaller Nova Scotia airports, such as Yarmouth and Sydney. ☐ Urge the federal government to return a greater share of the net profit it earns from Nova Scotia airport fees to the province's airports. ☐ Work with Canadian National, Via Rail Canada, as well as current and potential short-line operators, to identify new business cases for expanding freight and passenger rail service. Urge the federal government to improve the competitiveness

of major transportation assets, such as the Port of Halifax, through such ways as allowing major Canadian ports to issue tax-exempt bonds to raise capital for infrastructure

improvements.

Make a multi-year commitment to Brand Nova Scotia (minimum of \$700,000/year), to aggressively promote our products at home and abroad, increase procurement opportunities for local companies, and attract skilled expatriates/ immigrants to our province.
☐ Increase funding for the Business Retention and Expansion Program to ensure businesses stay and grow in Nova Scotia, with special attention to promoting Nova Scotia's agricultural and fish products.
□ Work with other governments to review securities regulations to provide more flexibility for the private sector, especially small businesses.
□ Introduce Fair is Fair legislation to ensure Nova Scotia business and Nova Scotia workers are provided a level playing field when governments in other jurisdictions unfairly restrict opportunities in their province.
□ Work together with community stakeholders to preserve the existing runway infrastructure at CFB Shearwater presently under the control of National Defence. With the infrastructure secured, develop a strategic plan to use Shearwater as a centre for the future growth of Nova Scotia's aerospace industry.
☐ Continue to press Ottawa to ensure Nova Scotia aerospace and advanced manufacturing companies receive a fair share of federal procurement opportunities.
Stronger communities
Working together to help all regions take charge of their own futures
Establish a Community Development Policy to help ensure the long-term sustainability and growth of Nova Scotia's communities, particularly smaller, rural communities, based on the advice gained through the Premier's Forum on Rural Issues and subsequent community consultations.
☐ Guarantee long-term financial support for the province's 13 Regional Development Authorities (RDAs).
□ Establish a Provincial Capital Commission to protect our provincial capital's valuable heritage sites and maximize the public benefit of provincially owned properties.

□ Continue to press the federal Minister of Transport to establish a permanent, long-term fund to address the capital needs of smaller ports, such as Sydney, Sheet Harbour, Yarmouth,

□ Cost-share, in conjunction with the municipalities, federal government and private sector a Main Street Program to help smaller communities improve their business centres.

Culture and hospitality

Building on the strength of our world-wide reputation

- ☐ Guarantee minimum one month processing time for small production companies eligible for the Nova Scotia's Film Development Tax Credit.
- □ Establish and fund Nova Scotia's first Music Strategy in consultation with the Music Industry Association of Nova Scotia, including developing new marketing and export opportunities that highlight Nova Scotia's musical talent.
- □ Develop, in partnership with the Tourism Partnership Council and the Tourism Industry Association of Nova Scotia, a Signature Attractions Program.
- □ Establish a new Nova Scotia Book Publishers Tax Credit and launch a new industry growth program for Nova Scotia Book publishers.
- Examine, in cooperation with other levels of government and key stakeholders, the feasibility of creating A Nova Scotia Celebration Centre to promote Halifax as a port of call. Centre would highlight Nova Scotia's heritage and culture, its innovation, musical and artist talent.
- Work with the Tourism Industry Association of Nova Scotia and Tourism Partnership Council to increase the value of tourism, including more support for off-season marketing.
- Support a variety of new attractions, including developing an application for UNESCO World Heritage designations for Joggins and Grand Pré, conducting a feasibility study for expanding the Maritime Museum of the Atlantic on the Halifax waterfront, and increasing promotional support for the Bay of Fundy region.
- ☐ Implement changes to the Accommodations Act and regulations to reduce the red tape burden on small tourism operators.
- □ Building on the anticipated success of the 2004 Congrès mondial acadien, work with all Nova Scotia communities, including First Nations, to promote the 400th anniversary of permanent European settlement in our province for the year 2005.

Energy opportunities

Promoting the development of offshore resources and energy technologies


- ☐ Adopt a new Energy Act, to help make the business climate more efficient and encourage more offshore exploration.

- Work with industry to establish the Energy Futures Scholarships for high school, community college and university students studying in the oil and gas sciences and related fields.

☐ Increase Nova Scotia's competitiveness in the energy industry by developing and funding a new program to help Nova Scotia companies secure federal funds aimed at upgrading technological or human resources. - □ Establish a tax credit for qualified mineral exploration to encourage responsible expenses related to flow-through shares.
- ☐ Undertake additional changes to the Mineral Resources Act to improve the management and administration of the province's mineral resources.
- Develop, in cooperation with the Office of Economic Development, a Mineral Development Strategy that will include a coordinated "one window" process for providing scientific, technical and policy information.



Proven Leadership - the Record

It's clear that having a plan for health care achieve results. We've come a long way since 1999.

In partnership with Nova Scotians, the John Hamm Government has:

- ✓ Hired more than 200 new doctors. Nova Scotia now has the second highest doctor-to-patient ratio in the country; an average of one new doctor every two weeks.
- ✓ Launched Nova Scotia's first Comprehensive Nursing Strategy. In the last year alone, Nova Scotia recruited more than 110 nurses from outside of the province.
- ✓ Introduced legislation to recognize nurse practitioners and funded new Nurse Practitioner training opportunities
- ✓ Guaranteed multi-year funding for our hospitals (the first in the country). Over the next three years front-line care will be supported with an additional investment of \$124 million, leading to better planning, better management and reduced wait times.
- ✓ Shortened wait times for nursing home care through Single Entry Access and protected the quality of care through an additional investment of \$75 million.

- ✓ Released a comprehensive plan to expand and improve access to primary health care that includes efforts to increase the number of community clinics and measures that will see doctors, nurses, nurses practitioners, and other key health professionals working side-by-side to better respond to the physical, mental and emotional needs of Nova Scotians.

- ✓ Invested in a new Medical and Health Information System to reduce redundant and expensive diagnostic testing and to ensure that vital patient records are quickly shared on an asneeded basis with professionals faster in the event of a medical emergency.
- ✓ Provided our hospitals with new clinical care planning tools and best practice guidelines to ensure decisions are based on solid medical information and best practices.
- ✓ Increased funding for respite care by \$3 Million.
- ✓ Increased the tax relief available to family caregivers by 75 per cent.
- ✓ Developed Canada's first standards for the diagnosis and treatment of osteoporosis and purchased more bone densitometers to prevent the onset or progression of chronic diseases that have a dramatic impact on the quality of life of Nova Scotians, particularly our seniors.


- To provide financial stability to health care professionals and planners so they can implement long-term plans to improve patient care and access.
- To ensure every Nova Scotian has access to the medical professionals they need.
- To promote choices that lead to healthy lifestyles for Nova Scotians.

We are committed to improving health care for Nova Scotians, providing better care and faster access. We will focus on doctors, nurses and other health professionals, shorter wait times, continuing care and independent living, better access to prescription drugs, and health promotion. In partnership with Nova Scotians, a Progressive Conservative Government will:

Doctors, Nurses and Health Professionals – securing the right number and mix of Health Care Professionals

- ☐ Add at least 350 more nurses to our health system.
- □ Continue to work with the Nova Scotia Nursing Network and fund Nova Scotia's Nursing Strategy by at least \$5.2 M in each of the next four years (20.8 M).

Nova Scotia Nursing Graduates



- □ Secure at least 100 more doctors through additional training and recruitment.
- ☐ In consultation with Dalhousie Medical School and the College of Physicians and Surgeons, streamline efforts to assess qualifications of internationally trained specialists and provide additional training opportunities for them to meet Canadian standards.
- □ Develop a long-term plan (currently under discussion with Dalhousie Medical School) to train more undergraduates and residents. To ensure we keep the doctors we train, seats will be set aside for Nova Scotia students with deferred tuition agreements for doctors who agree to work in communities where they are needed most.
- ☐ Introduce a new Medical Student Paid Co-op Program to support physicians in under- serviced areas and to encourage more medical students to pursue family practice.
- ☐ Train an additional 88 medical lab technologists, over the next four years, providing bursaries for those who agree to work in Nova Scotia.
- ☐ Use the information from the current assessment of 29 health professions (including X- Ray technologists, dieticians and pharmacists) to identify new training needs and incentives to address projected shortages.
- □ Provide bursaries to advanced paramedics in return for service agreements.

Shorter Wait Lists

- □ Invest an additional \$45 million (Federal Equipment Fund) over the next three years in new medical and diagnostic equipment and staff training, including increasing the availability of MRI services in southwest and northern regions of the province.
- Require all District Health Authorities to monitor and report on wait list information using common measurement tools and standards. This information will be used to identify and develop plans to address priority areas, including providing funding for over time and weekend surgeries.
- ☐ Establish a Provincial Wait list Information Service so patients and their doctors have access to information on where testing or treatment can be accessed fastest.
- ☐ Use information gathered from current review of Emergency Room Service to reduce wait times for emergency care.
- Expand the number of community-clinics, including piloting specialized clinics (i.e. casting, splinting and stitching clinics) to reduce pressures on hospital-based emergency rooms, providing faster care to patients requiring immediate attention but non-life threatening care, as well as patients requiring urgent hospital-based care.
- ☐ Continue to expand the Hospital Information Management System so that all hospitals in Nova Scotia can share vital patient information, reducing costly duplication of diagnostic testing and sharing vital information in the event of a medical emergency.

Nursing Home Care and Independent Living

- □ Invest an additional \$36.2 Million over next three years to cover the full medical costs of nursing home care and end all asset calculations for nursing home placement.
- □ Report and respond to recommendations for additional long-term care beds or other assisted living options based on findings of the Continuing Care review (currently underway). Also examine new, innovative alternatives for supporting independent living, including piloting client-focused assisted living projects with other governments.
- □ Establish a task force on Nova Scotia's aging population to make recommendations about future health and social programming needs.
- Based on recommendations from working groups currently examining rural Palliative Care, identify and fund next steps to expand access to end of life care.

Access to Prescription Drugs

- ☐ Introduce a new Low Income Drug Assistance Plan for diabetics without drug coverage. As resources allow, extend the program to low income Nova Scotians with other chronic diseases.
- Aggressively promote 'Knowledge is the Best Medicine' an education campaign designed to prevent the over-use or misuse of prescription drugs.
- ☐ Work to expand the number of prescription drugs currently assessed under the Provincial Drug Monitoring Program.

Working with Health Partners

"In the past four years, my government has worked closely with non-profit organizations and our other health partners such as Community Health Boards and District Health Authorities to gather the information and set out the plans that will help Nova Scotians lead healthier, happier and more productive lives. We understand that in order to improve our overall health status, individual Nova Scotians, young and old, need to be supported in their efforts to lead healthier lives. We also understand that government must lead the way through better information, increased emphasis on healthy life-style choices at home, in school, in the workplace, and in our communities. - Outline a detailed plan with time lines for achieving the objectives outlined in the Nova Scotia Task Force on Primary Health Care, including more aggressively supporting an "integrated team approach" in care delivery.
- ☐ Implement the Report of the Integrated Stroke Care Strategy Committee in consultation with District Health Authorities. Strategy will include establishing a comprehensive and integrated stroke care system that includes health promotion, emergency and acute care, and rehabilitation.

- ☐ Develop and implement a Provincial Injury and Accident Prevention Strategy, including a Falls Prevention Education Campaign targeted to Nova Scotia's senior population.
- □ Continue to expand community-based mental health services by introducing crisis intervention services in all districts.
- ☐ Increase our investment in the professionals, community networks and equipment required to support cancer care.
- □ Develop additional 'shared care' pilots that link physicians with mental health professionals for effective early identification and treatment of depression and anxiety.
- ☐ Provide Community Health Boards with annual funding to support community-based health promotion and disease prevention strategies. On-going funding will be tied to a rigorous evaluation of outcomes.
- ☐ Create a "Kids N Care" navigation system for children and youth with emotional and behavioral problems to provide for early intervention and improved health outcomes.
- ☐ Introduce a new Mental Health Services Act.

Healthy Schools, Healthy Workplaces, Healthy Communities, Healthy Policy



- Maximize the value of Nova Scotia's public health professionals (public health nurses, addictions counselors, paramedics, nutritionists etc) by examining new opportunities for their involvement in schools, Family Resource Centres and supporting CHBs in community health planning.
- □ Work with non-government organizations, including Health Charities Network and Sport Nova Scotia, to identify new strategies to encourage individual businesses and workplace organizations (Chambers of Commerce, Boards of Trade, Labour) to promote workplace health.
- □ Ensure District Health Authorities and Community Health Boards have current and reliable information, allowing them to appropriately assess the health status of a community and establish targets for improving health in each community.
- □ Provide ongoing training and development opportunities for DHAs and CHBs in the areas of community mobilization, understanding and evaluating data, and the factors that influence health.
- Work with the Atlantic Health Promotion Research Centre to implement recommendations based on food security research to ensure healthy food choices are more accessible to all Nova Scotians
- Partner with municipalities and the Union of Nova Scotia Municipalities to encourage and enhance development of trails and green ways.



- ✓ Invested \$3.3 million in math textbooks, mental math resources, graphing calculators and other math learning tools.
- ✓ Increased teaching time in math, reading and writing through a new Time to Learn strategy.
- ✓ Tied professional development plans for teachers with new math and language arts programs.

Supporting success for all students

- ✓ Added \$7.7 million (2000-03) for students with special needs, including \$2.5 million to hire resource teachers, speech language pathologists and other professionals.
- ✓ Increased the number of computers in schools (now one for every seven students compared to one for every 24 in 1996).
- ✓ Expanded access to Core French programs.
- ✓ Introduced a new racial equity policy.
- ✓ Funded the Youth Pathways and Transition Program to help at-risk students make a smooth transition from high school to college or university.

Increasing attention to results, increased accountability to parents

- ✓ Introduced more student testing and began sharing results in an annual Minister's Report to Parents.
- ✓ Developed and piloted a new standard report card, including letter and number grades, to provide students and parents with more and better information on student performance.

Supporting safe, healthy schools

- ✓ Spent \$212 million on new school construction, renovations and additions between 1999 and 2003.
- Scrapped the costly and chaotic P-3 School Construction Program.
- Funded pilots to help address school bullying and support the new Code of Conduct.

A Plan that's Working the Next Steps

We will continue to build on our plan for all levels of education and ensure that learning translates into success for a lifetime. Our priorities include putting the basics first, focusing on the student, helping those in need of extra support, being accountable to parents, supporting teachers in the classroom, and providing a safe and healthy place to learn. We will also focus on more training, research and resources.

Our goals:

- To improve the performance of Nova Scotia Students in national and international testing.
- To reduce the teacher to student ratio.
- To foster a culture of learning earlier in a child's life.
- To maximize opportunities for young people to live and work at home.

Primary to Grade 12

In partnership with Nova Scotians, a Progressive Conservative Government will:

□ Increase funding by an additional \$1,000 per student by year four.

Increase Support for the early years

- □ Pilot a new Ready to Learn voluntary, free pre-school program for 4-year-olds, developed by the departments of Community Services, Education and Health. Curriculum will be activity-based, and emphasize socialization skills, to help children become more "ready to learn" by the time they enter school. Assessments, such as hearing and speech, will be carried out through the Ready to Learn program to target early intervention services for children in need. The first pilots will be targeted in areas where day care access is limited, and where school space is now available. Pilot evaluations will be conducted to determine the benefits of making the program universally available.
- □ Increase the number of Family Resource Centres offering Early Language and Learning Programs. Programs provide parents, family resource and child care staff with training to enhance child's language and cognitive development.
- ☐ Promote greater use of parent volunteers within Family Resource Centres.
- ☐ Further reduce class sizes to provide more one-on-one teaching time.
- □ Beginning in 2005, combined Primary-Grade 1 classes would have a maximum of 20 students or an additional non-teaching adult in the classroom. These criteria would also apply to Primary and Grade 1 classes with students with special needs who have an individual program plan.

☐ In 2006, all grade three classes will have a maximum of 25 students. ☐ In 2007 all grade four classes will have a maximum of 25 students. Basics first Provide students with at least one million more books, math tools, learnware packages and teaching resources (by Year 4). ☐ Continue testing program, including a new Grade 6 language arts test, where parents are provided, for the first time, with their child's individualized test results. ☐ Use individualized test results (Reading and Math) and teacher assessments to identify struggling students, and provide intervention and support for them in junior high to achieve better learning outcomes. Provide parents with additional information and strategies that support at home learning, such as "homework baggies" with learning activity cards. Emphasis will be placed on the early years in reading, writing and math. Success for all students ☐ Complete the Learning For Life plan for students with special needs, including more professionals, assistive technology, Reading Recovery™ available to all Grade 1 classes, and individualized support for students (\$17.4 Million, 2003-2006). Develop and fund a new tuition support program for special needs students with individual program plans. The program will include a faster appeal process, including an ombudsman for students with special needs. The ombudsman will have authority to recommend options, including providing the equivalent of the annual per student funding to parents for students with IPPs attending private schools. Additional support could be offered to low-income families so ability to pay is not a barrier. As well, accountability agreements would be required with private schools. ☐ Establish a professional certification requirement for all new teacher assistants. Professional development will be provided for existing teacher assistants to upgrade their skills, as necessary, to meet the needs of the children they support. ■ Expand the range of advanced high school in-class and distance education courses to include language arts, social sciences and the arts. ☐ Add resources to support the long-term viability of isolated rural schools, including establishing minimum standards for delivering classroom and distance education.

□ In 2006, the criteria (combined classes/IPP students) for a 20 student maximum will extend to Grade 1-2 and 2-3 classes.

Attention to results, accountability to parents

- □ Amend the mandate of School Advisory Councils to provide parents with a more meaningful role.
- □ Establish a province-wide School Accreditation Program with public reporting. Schools that need assistance will be provided with targeted resources, through the school advisory council, to support the school's improvement plan.
- □ Launch an interactive Web site to provide parents with plain language information on what students are expected to learn and achieve at different grades levels.
- ☐ Initiate structural, administrative and accountability changes, in consultation with teachers, schools boards and parent groups, to improve student results.

Teachers

- □ Streamline the Teacher Certification process for faster turnaround time and broader course recognition.
- □ Continue to expand professional development opportunities for teachers in priority areas such as math and language arts.
- Audit the number of teachers teaching out of their field of study. Working with school boards, the Nova Scotia Teachers Union, and universities, identify strategies to better match teachers to their subject specialties.

Safe, healthy schools

- ☐ Continue to invest in school construction, additions and renovations.
- ☐ Implement the recommendations of the Provincial Student Education Council report on bullying, including providing province-wide training sessions for teachers.



- ✓ Introduced a new Apprenticeship Act and a modern apprenticeship program to make trades training more accessible to Nova Scotians. A new youth apprenticeship program will help young people get on track early for trades training.

Supported research and lifelong learning

More training opportunities

- □ Increase the number of community college seats by another 1200 through multi-year funding for the Community College Growth Plan. The plan includes a new metro campus and upgrades at each of the provinces 13 campuses.
- ☐ Continue to expand apprenticeship training and help apprentices complete their training more quickly, including support for Nova Scotians who need to upgrade their literacy or numeracy skills before pursuing trades training.
- ☐ Increase our investment in the Nova Scotia School for Adult Learners to expand opportunities for older Nova Scotians to upgrade their education and skills.

Students, universities, libraries

- ☐ Increase student debt relief by doubling the employment and repayment bonuses in the new Student Debt Relief Plan.
- ☐ Guarantee multi-year funding for universities based on negotiated Memorandums of Understanding designed to: control tuition increases; reduce duplication; identify and support program offerings in areas that address Nova Scotia's skill needs; and make it easier to transfer credits among universities and community colleges.
- □ Develop a province-wide, comprehensive single-entry career development, education and employment service. Service would include more resources and support for in-school counseling and improve information sharing between business, labour, industry and education providers.



☐ Continue supporting university research through the Nova Scotia Research and Innovation Trust Fund.

More Support for Seniors

Protecting the core values of Nova Scotians has been important to us over the past four years. This includes protecting seniors, working families, our environment, and our cultural diversity. We are also committed to consumer protection and keeping our communities safe.

Proven Leadership - the Record

In partnership with Nova Scotians, the John Hamm Government has worked hard to support our seniors, including:

- Removing the grandfather clause on the Property Tax Rebate program, ensuring all qualifying seniors receive tax relief on their homes.
- ✓ Exempting 7,000 additional low income seniors from paying the annual pharmacare premium, establishing maximum co-pays and investing almost \$10 Million in 2003 to freeze the annual co-pay and premium.
- Ensuring care needs, not ability to pay, determined nursing home placements.
- ✓ Introducing Single Entry Access to make it easier and faster to access home care and/or long-term care.
- ✓ Increasing Home Care funding by almost \$40 Million.
- ✓ Increasing Long Term care funding by \$74 Million and exempted more seniors' assets from when entering nursing homes. (Continuing Care increase of \$114 Million since 1999).
- ✓ Funding three Alzheimer's drugs through the Provincial Pharmacare Plan. The first province in Atlantic Canada to do so.
- ✓ Implementing new standards for the diagnosis and treatment of osteoporosis and new funding for bone densitometers.
- ✓ Increasing funding for respite care.

- ✓ Increasing tax relief for family caregivers by 75 per cent.
- ✓ Providing a \$40 discount for seniors who voluntarily participate in safe driving programs.
- ✓ Redesigning the Programs for Senior's Directory to make it easier to read and more comprehensive.
- ✓ Funding additional staff through the Senior Citizen's Secretariat to ensure better outreach with seniors and improved service.
- ✓ Recognizing our veterans through the declaration of a Veterans Memorial Highway and the creation of a veterans' license plate, in concert with the Royal Canadian Legion.

A Plan that's Working - the Next Steps

- ☐ Implement our plan to cover all health care nursing home costs and protect all seniors' assets by no later than year four.
- ☐ Increase the number of long-term care beds/other assisted living options, including day programs based on recommendation of Continuing Care Review (currently underway).
- □ Eliminate car insurance rate discrimination against seniors.
- ☐ Introduce legislation to eliminate mandatory retirement within the Civil Service.
- □ Launch an aggressive Falls Prevention strategy to help educate seniors about the steps they can take to prevent falls and injury.
- □ Dedicate additional resources to promote healthy living among older Nova Scotians and to develop communitybased, peer-support and volunteer senior's networks.
- Expand Palliative Care to provide, high-quality access to end-of-life care to more Nova Scotian families.
- ☐ Increase the income ceiling for seniors applying to the Senior Citizens' Assistance Program (SCAP) from \$20,000 to \$22,000. Program provides seniors with assistance to make emergency repairs to their home.

□ Launch a five-year Elder Abuse Strategy, including a comprehensive, coordinated campaign involving government, non-government agencies, as well as the private sector, designed to identify and address elder abuse. Strategy will also include new legislation to stiffen fines for those who physically, emotional or financially abuse seniors.

Supporting Families and Nova Scotians in Need

In partnership with Nova Scotians, the John Hamm Government has worked hard to help families and Nova Scotians in need by:

- ✓ Reduced provincial income taxes by 10 per cent effective July 1, 2003.
- Created a new Integrated Child Benefit and eliminated the clawback on the National Child Benefit.
- ✓ Supported Nova Scotians with disabilities by dedicating over \$1.5 Million to expand community-based transportation services and over \$1.1 Million to help more than 180 community groups make their buildings more accessible.
- ✓ Introduced new welfare-to-work incentives, including 400 more childcare spaces, increased transportation benefits, and extending Pharmacare to one year beyond assistance.

- □ Provide low-income diabetics without drug coverage with assistance in covering cost of insulin and diabetic supplies. As resources permit, gradually increase drug coverage to other low-income Nova Scotians with chronic diseases.

- ✓ Passing legislation to freeze new auto insurance rate hikes until January 1, 2004.
- Passing regulations restricting the underwriting practices of insurance companies.
- Appointing an actuary to assist in devloping additional car insurance reforms.
- Establishing a new Nova Scotia Review Board on Automobile Insurance.
- ✓ Establishing, in partnership with the other Atlantic provinces, the Atlantic Insurance Harmonization Task Force.
- ✓ Changing the Consumer Protection Act and the Mortgage Lenders and Brokers Acts to provide consumers with greater information and protection when entering into mortgage agreements.
- ✓ Amending the Consumer Protection Act to provide consumers with the right to basic information about sellers, contracts and on-line products and services.
- ✓ Introducing legislation requiring gasoline retailers to post gas prices.
- ✓ Funding to assist low income Nova Scotian with the cost of heating oil.
- Protecting retail gasoline dealers from the unfair downloading of national advertising campaigns to the local level.

Consumer Protection/Insurance

A Plan that's Working - the Next Steps

- □ Reduce automobile insurance by an average of at least 20 percent through a realistic 6-step plan:
 - ☐ Freeze on new rates increases from May 03 to January 04.
 - □ New restrictions on underwriting practices to prohibit discrimination based on age, sex non-driving related matters, and previous coverage in Facility Association.
 - Requirement for a basic auto insurance package with a cap on minor injury claims and greater openness on the part of insurance companies.
 - Establish a new Automobile Insurance Review Panel to approve all insurance rates and appoint a new actuary to ensure fair underwriting practices.
 - ☐ Extend the consumer advocate position.
 - Work with other Atlantic Provinces to harmonize insurance legislation and regulations and assess costs and benefits of a regional public insurance system.
- □ Allow for a trial period for Sunday shopping six weeks prior to Christmas, followed by a province-wide plebiscite in the fall of 2004 to determine if Nova Scotians want Sunday Shopping year-round.

Safer Communities/Streets

Proven Leadership - the Record

Together with Nova Scotians, the John Hamm Government has worked hard to make our roads and communities safer and to ensure balanced justice, including:

- ✓ Passing the Domestic Violence Intervention Act, giving victims of violence greater protection.
- Establishing a new Justice Learning Centre, to support police and other law enforcement agencies in their efforts to combat family violence.
- ✓ Increasing funding for legal aid for low-income Nova Scotians.
- ✓ Passing a Volunteer Protection Act to provide greater legal protection for not-for-profit, charitable organizations.
- ✓ Passing a Volunteer Fire Services Act and Firefighters' Compensation Act to provide greater benefits for volunteer and professional firefighters.
- ✓ Increasing capital highway spending by \$68 million over the last three years.
- ✓ Adopting numerous measures to improve highway safety, including: adopting tough anti- drunk driving measures such as 24-hour roadside suspensions; new school zone signing and piloting new highway rest areas.
- ✓ Lobbying the federal government to establish a Registry of Sex Offenders in conjunction with other provincial and territorial governments.


- ✓ Joining other provinces in refusing to use scarce provincial resources to prosecute charges under the federal long-gun registry.
- Adopting numerous amendments to the Justice Administration Act to streamline and improve legal and judicial services.

Safer Communities/Streets

A Plan that's Working - the Next Steps

- □ Adopt new anti-drunk driving measures such as more sobriety check points.
- ☐ Continue to urge the federal government to make the National Sex Offender Registry retroactive so that vital information on previously convicted offenders is available to police and law enforcement agencies.
- ☐ Sponsor an all-party resolution of the legislature calling on Ottawa to stop allowing conditional sentences for violent crimes, like manslaughter and sexual assault.
- ☐ Increase resources to support the Domestic Violence Case Co-ordination Program.
- ☐ Implement a new Justice Enterprise Information Network to improve information sharing among justice officials.
- ☐ Improve access to the Supreme Court Family Division and urge the federal government to expand services province-wide.
- Establish a province-wide youth court to ensure effective prosecution of young offenders.
- ☐ Increase support for victims of crime, including through additional measures to force criminals to provide restitution.
- ☐ Continue to urge Ottawa to match Nova Scotia's increased support for legal aid.
- Continue to work with the federal government, RCMP and local law enforcement agencies to take whatever new steps necessary to protect public safety in the face of new terrorist threats.

Order in the House Fiscal Responsibility and Accountability


"I believe that fiscal responsibility and accountability are crucial to attracting new investment, creating new jobs and generating the revenues needed to pay for vital services in future.

In 1999, there was no plan to eliminate Nova Scotia's \$500 million deficit, to slow the rate of growth of the province's out-of-control debt, or to stimulate the economy through lower taxes.

That is why four years ago, I told Nova Scotians that a government under my leadership would eliminate Nova Scotia's \$500 million deficit within three years, provide tax relief the year after and set realistic targets for reducing the debt. I also told Nova Scotians that balancing the budget would not have to come at the expense of their priorities: better education, health care and roads. My plan also spoke of the need to maximize the value of every tax dollar, as well as the need for greater accountability and openness." — John Hamm

Proven Leadership - the Record

Clearly, a lot has been accomplished toward greater fiscal responsibility and accountability over the past four years. In partnership with Nova Scotians, the John Hamm Government has:

- ✓ Invested more money in our schools, hospitals and roads in each and every year we were in government.
- ✓ Tabled Nova Scotia's first truly balanced budget in 40 years in 2002-03, followed by second balanced budget this year.
- ✓ Lowered personal income taxes by 10 percent effective July 1, 2003, with full costs netted against provincial revenues.
- ✓ Lowered small business taxes by raising the limit under which the small business tax rate applies saving qualifying business \$2,750 this year.
- ✓ Adopted Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP), the most open and transparent accounting practices in the country.
- ✓ Required government departments to publicly release annual business plans and annually report on their success in meeting performance targets.
- ✓ Improved Nova Scotia's Debt-to-GDP ratio, the most commonly used indicator determining a government's ability to re-pay its debt. In 1999-2000 the ratio of net direct debt to gross domestic product was 46 percent. In 2003-04 it is estimated at 41.1 percent.
- ✓ Exceeded targets for reducing Nova Scotia's Foreign Currency Exposure. In 1999, it was above 50 per cent. Today it is under 20 per cent.
- ✓ Applied annual operating surpluses, as well as the proceeds from the sale of Crown assets (Sysco, NSRL) directly to the debt.

- ✓ Introduced a capital borrowing program that, for the first time, includes making annual payments toward the cost of new investments in our schools, hospitals and roads over their expected life- span.
- ✓ Significantly slowed the rate at which the debt has grown.

 During the previous government's term in office the debt grew \$600 million a year on average (\$3.6 billion), compared to \$125 million a year on average (\$500 million) over the past four years.
- ✓ Introduced a realistic Debt Reduction Plan, while still allowing for further capital investments in our roads, schools and hospitals.
- ✓ Introduced new financial accountability controls for third party spending such as school boards, District Health Authorities, and established new business plan review process for Longterm Care facilities.

"In 1999, many Nova Scotians said we couldn't possibly keep our commitment to invest in roads, hospitals and schools and still balance the budget and lower taxes. But we had a plan and we stuck to it and the results are now showing. Record numbers of Nova Scotians working, fewer Nova Scotians are on welfare, and more leading-edge companies are making Nova Scotia their new home. Sound fiscal management, combined with the energy and confidence of Nova Scotia's private sector, helped make this possible. Together we've made good progress. Together we can accomplish so much more."

A Plan that's Working - the Next Steps

Budgeting responsibly and answering to Nova Scotians remains a priority.

Our goals:

- · Increase public/private capital investment.
- Improve Nova Scotia's credit rating.

We will work hard to meet these goals over the next four years. In partnership with Nova Scotians, a Progressive Conservative Government will:

- Continue to post uninterrupted balanced budgets.
- Continue to address Nova Scotia's significant infrastructure deficit with increased capital spending on roads, schools and hospitals over the next four years.
- □ Introduce legislation and enshrine in law a three-part Debt Reduction Plan that includes: annual process of creating surpluses and contingency reserves for debt reduction; establishing a Debt Retirement Fund for retiring specific debt issues; and, designating a portion of Extraordinary Revenue to Debt Retirement Fund.
- ☐ Conduct, in consultation with the Union of Nova Scotia Municipalities, a cost/benefit analysis to determine the potential of using provincial/municipal tax exempt bonds as a means of raising capital for future municipal infrastructure improvements.
- Enhance efforts to ensure provincial tax dollars are spent for their intended purpose (i.e. school maintenance dollars are spent on school maintenance) by conducting more value for money assessments of third party spending (i.e. school boards, District Health Authorities and universities).
- □ Provide 10% payroll income tax deduction effective January 2004.
- Continue to ensure Nova Scotia maintains the most competitive tax environment in Atlantic Canada.

- □ Adopt future changes to Generally Accepted Accounting Principles within reasonable time frames, to ensure Nova Scotia remains a leader in open, accountable and transparent accounting practices.
- □ Identify and implement new opportunities for bulk purchasing at the provincial level.
- □ Introduce standard accounting, payroll and human resource systems for larger public service entities to ensure maximum value for money and to enhance accountability throughout the broader public service.


The four year plan you have just read is grounded by our fiscal reality, guided by our values as Nova Scotians and driven by our commitment to do what is doable.
